This journal will become a keepsake for you and your family—a special book of memories all about you!






A seahorse does not swim like other fish do. It moves through the water like a rocking horse. Its head looks like a horse's head. It uses its long **snout** to suck up food.

GIRAFFE


The giraffe is famous for its long neck. We also know it because of its spots.
