



# **Activities for Finding the** Problem and the Solution



What's the Problem? Copy What's the Problem? (page 80), one per student. Have students read a book and then answer the questions about the main problem in the story. This activity can be used many times throughout the year with a variety of texts.

Problem and Solution Comic Strip (pages 81–82) for each student. Make additional copies as needed. Have students begin reading a book, describing the problems and solutions as they develop in the story. Next, have students draw a picture for each problem and solution. Then have students cut out the comic strip pieces and glue them together in order. These comic strips can be displayed on a bulletin board titled "Problem and Solution Comic Strips."



**Problem and Solution Storyboard** Copy Problem and Solution Storyboard (page 83), one per student. Using page 83 and a piece of 12" x 18" construction paper, students will create their own problem and solution storyboards. Students will begin by reading a book. Then they will write three problems and three solutions on the storyboard cards. Next, students will draw pictures for each problem and solution. After each storyboard card has been completed, students will cut out the cards and glue the problems and solutions in order onto the piece of construction paper. These storyboards can be decorated and displayed on a bulletin board titled "A Problem in Every Story."
