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
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Introduction

The old adage "practice makes perfect" can really hold true for a child's education. The more practice and exposure a child has to concepts being taught in school, the more success they are likely to find. For many parents, knowing how to best support their child's learning can be frustrating. This book is designed to eliminate the guesswork for parents using it at home while also being a valuable resource for educators using it in the classroom. *Here's how:* As Pre-K and Kindergarten students learn to read, they will need to connect the letters they see to the sounds they hear. 

Helpful Tips

- Keep practice sessions short, positive, and constructive. Help with instructions. Ask your young learner to repeat what they are being asked to do for each practice page.
- First, encourage your young learner to trace each letter on the alphabet pages with their index finger. Then, help them write the letters on the lines.
- Focus on the sounds that each letter makes. Mention that these are the most common sounds for some letters and that they will continue to learn more sounds as they learn to read.
- Look for ways to encourage your young learner to use the words and skills they are learning in their everyday lives. Look for words in signs, books, and other print items.
- Make flashcards or lists of words that have the same beginning consonant or short-vowel sound.





Directions: Name each item and listen to the beginning sound. Color the pictures that begin with the **t** sound. Cross out the items that do not begin with the **t** sound.




